Adoption Search

A research guide for adoptees in New York State

Introduction

This guide is designed to assist persons researching their own adoption, or the adoption of a living/recently deceased relative. New York State adoption records were sealed from 1936-January 15, 2020.

Currently, adult adoptees (18 and older) can obtain their pre-adoption birth certificates for a fee. To do so, contact the New York State Department of Vital Records: https://www.health.ny.gov/vital_records/preadoption.htm

Getting Started & Search Tips

- Currently, adult adoptees (18 and older) can obtain their pre-adoption birth certificates for a fee. To do so, contact the New York State Department of Vital Records: <u>https://www.health.ny.gov/vital_records/preadoption.htm</u>
- Write down everything you know in notebook to keep organized.
- Talk to relatives if possible, and gather any family records available to you.
- Read adoption laws for the area in which you were born. NY State law: <u>http://ww2.nycourts.gov/courts/7jd/courts/surrogates/proceedings/adoption.shtml</u>
- If you are younger than 18 and were born in New York State, request your birth certificate from the city/town vital office or NY State DOH. (*This is the "amended" record, but place of birth and possibly hospital or doctor's information may be present and correct*).
- Register with the <u>New York State Adoption Registry</u> and the <u>International Soundex</u> <u>Reunion Registry</u>.
- Read helpful research guides, including the books and websites suggested below.
- Search local sources such as yearbooks, city directories, and newspapers for possible birth announcements and legal notice on adoption.
- Consider DNA testing.

Adoption Registries

New York State Health Department's Adoption Information Registry: For adoptees, biological siblings, and birth parents. It provides non-identifying information (appearance, occupation, and other facts), and identifying and medical information (if both adoptee and birth parent are registered). <u>www.health.state.ny.us/vital_records/adoption.htm</u>

Vital records: Birth, Marriage, and Death

Births:

Adult (18 and older) adoptees can order their New York State pre-adoption birth certificate through the New York State Department of Health: https://www.health.ny.gov/vital_records/preadoption.htm

New York State Vital Records Index: This microfiche index in the Grosvenor Room provides the date and town/city of birth, and the state certificate number. Individuals are listed by their birth name only.

- Buffalo: 1914 to 1937; Available through 1942 in Ancestry Library Edition
- NY State: 1881 to 1937 (Except Albany and Yonkers until 1914, and NYC); Available through 1942 in Ancestry Library Edition

Birth Announcements in Newspapers: Names of babies intended for adoption were not usually released to newspapers, but a notice may have mistakenly been published. Look through the

Buffalo News, Courier-Express, and Buffalo Daily Law Journal for a few weeks or even months after the date of birth to learn the names of those born on your birth date. There is no index of local newspaper birth notices. The Vital Records Office of Buffalo City Hall stopped releasing baby names to newspapers in 2006.
